THE CENSUS IS COMING

The year 2000 means more than the beginning of a new millennium, it is time to count every man, woman and child in America for the United States Census Bureau. Beginning April 1, 2000 every household will receive a questionnaire asking basic questions about you and your family. Households receiving the short form will only have to answer eight fill-in the blank questions, which cover top-

ics such as name, sex, age, relationship, race and whether you own or rent your house. One out of six households chosen at random will be sent a long form that will ask questions about your education, ancestry, employment, disability and house heating fuel. The long form is necessary to get socioeconomic information needed for a wide range of government and federal programs. Don't worry, most households will receive the short form. Regardless of which questionnaire you

receive, any information gathered from your household is confidential. By law, the Census Bureau cannot share your information with any other government agency.

Your cooperation is needed from the Census Bureau and the City. Accounting for every resident of Wood River can mean more state and federal money for roads, schools, parks and assistance programs. Your input can help decision makers identify trends in areas such as development, labor markets, economics and housing. All of this information is vital when setting community goals. This information cannot be gathered and become beneficial to you and your family unless you fill out the questionnaires and send it in.

What happens if you don't send it in? For questionnaires

that are incomplete, a Census employee must contact you to obtain the missing information. In cases where the questionnaire is not returned, the Census Bureau is employing thousands of workers to canvass areas and gather the needed information. That could mean additional mailings and possibly a visit by a Census employee. All of the additional costs of postage and employees to

gather the information is paid through your tax dollars. Help avoid a costly census by taking a few minutes to fill out the questionnaire accurately and send it in. For more information on the Census 2000, you can visit the United States Census Bureau homepage at www.census.gov.

To remain fully staffed during the 2000 Census, the United States Census Bureau

is looking to recruit individuals starting in December. The bureau is looking for a wide range of people to fill temporary jobs with a starting salary of \$9.50/hour plus .31/mile in gas reimbursement. Workers can be people who want to schedule another job around their current employment, as well as retirees, participants in government programs and people who are not currently employed.

The Census Bureau is striving to employ people to work within the neighborhoods in which they live. The Census is not an office job. Workers will spend most of their time locating addresses and conducting door-to-door interviews. In order to find people at home, census takers must be able to work evenings and weekends.

With the approach of the Millennium, we find ourselves looking at another possible disaster. Unlike a natural disaster, however, this one is man-made and totally predictable, almost. ary 1st, 2000. Some computers and the informational systems connected to them can't deal with the year 00 and may shut down or lock up. This could lead to some interesting problems.


In the past ten years, we have all come to enjoy the unique lifestyle made possible by computers and com-

puter chips. We can buy groceries, gas, or a new toaster and never write a check or carry cash. We can start our cars and know that the fuel, oil, electronics, perhaps even the air in the tires are okay. We can program our VCRs and the wall thermostat for up to a year or more. We can call home from almost anywhere in the world at any time. But, suppose these conveniences were gone for an hour, a day, a week, or more.

For the past several months, the state, the city, and business community have been examining the problems Y2K could create. Probable trouble spots have been examined, scenarios played out, plans developed, and still no one is sure of the impact. Two things most officials agree upon are: we should all do our best to prepare, both as a community and as individuals, and don't panic. Y2K isn't a hurricane, a tornado, or a flood; Y2K will be, at most, a disruption of conveniences we've come to know and love.


As an individual, this is what the State Office of Emergency Management Agency recommends you do to prepare. Do a home evaluation. Update your home computer to be Y2K compliant. Check other timed appliances by setting them to 12/ 31/99 to see if they shut down

> your old "Earthquake" disaster kit still packed away, drag it out and update it. If not, make one up. There's still Mother Nature's storms to contend with in the future. Your kit should include bottled water, candles, a flash light, portable radio, fresh batteries, trash bags, blankets, other things you may need if



Finally, don't panic. There may or may not be interruptions in utilities or vital services. These, however, will be the first things corrected if there are disruptions. If, for example, your phone is out of service, it may be that all the lines are tied up. January 1st is a big day for calling relatives and friends. If your power is out, some transfers on the grid may be needed. The utility companies are prepared to make adjustments.





STORMWATER

Please remember the City has a combined Sewer System, meaning it handles both sanitary and stormwater in the same pipes. If it rains or snow melts, there is a possibility this water could backup into basements. It is best to take all precautions necessary to keep the water from backing up and causing damage. Examples for protection are drain plugs, a valve off the main line or a backflow preventer on the main line.

SNOW ROUTES

Please remember when we have a snowstorm of two inches or more accumulation, it is unlawful to park on a Snow Route until the streets are cleared from curb to curb. If it is expected to snow overnight, please move your vehicle off the street <u>before</u> you go to bed for the night.

CHRISTMAS TREE RECY-CLING

You may dispose of your Christmas Tree at the 14th Street Garage Facility at no charge from December 26th through January 24. The Center is located at 14th and Madison (Route 143), and is open every Friday, Saturday, and Monday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m., and Sunday from Noon to 4 p.m. Please remove all ornaments and tinsel from the Christmas tree before bringing it to the facility.



In this issue, we salute Officer Jim Chapman for his dedication in teaching CPR classes to over 1,000 residents and professionals on his off-duty time. Since March 1994, Officer Chapman has trained individuals in how to save a person's life through cardiopulmonary resuscitation. His motivation to train citizens is due to the fact that only 8% of Madison County residents who suffer a heart attack actually survive.

How to recognize that someone is choking, how to perform the Heimlich maneuver, how to open airways, check breathing, take a pulse and start chest compressions are all part of the American Heart Association training led by Chapman and Roxana Parks & Recreation Director Debbie Hunt. Chapman said, "This training is something everyone needs to know how to do - adults and children. We hope you'll never need to use it, but we should all be prepared to save another's life because we never know when we may need to do it."

Jim is willing to travel to a company to offer a course for its employees, as well as any civic organization and groups of neighbors interested in learning CPR for the first time or in refreshing their certification. The training is \$20 per person and the number to call is 254-7485. The City commends Jim for his dedication and interest in serving our community.



CITY MANAGER'S M E S S A G E

"The City - a business"

Sometimes I am asked if the City is a business. The answer is yes and no. Organizationally, the City is structured like a business. The organizational chart is a standard pyramid design with the City Council near the top and the employees at the bottom.

All powers the City possesses are derived from the citizens of Wood River. All of you corporately are the head of the City. Under you are your elected officials, the City Council. The Council could be equated to a Board of Directors of a corporation. The Council (board) makes policies and determines the mission and the overall level of services that the City provides.

The City Council hires and supervises a City Manager (Chief Administrative Officer) to manage City departments and employees. The manager is in charge of personnel, purchasing, finances and operation. The manager hires department heads (upper level management) to supervise the individual departments. From an organizational standpoint, the City closely resembles a business.

When we examine the functions of the City, we begin to see differences between the City and a business. First and foremost, the City does not operate to make a profit. This makes for a big difference between the City and a business. Although some of the City's Enterprise Funds are profitable, the intent of the City is to balance expenditures against revenues.

Like a business, the City does have a product. That product is services. Unlike business, the City does not sell its services, it delivers them. The City does utilize many business practices: on-the-job training of employees, planning, budgeting, marketing, and striving for efficiency are a few.

Second, business and the City differ as to the level of responsiveness. The individual stockholder of a business or corporation has little if any influence. The individual citizen, however, can have direct contact with the Board (City Council) and the Chief Administrative Office (City Manager). Citizens can even contact department heads and employees, a practice that is almost unheard of in business.

Third, the organization and operation of the City is designed to reflect the democratic process. Unlike a business which is often authoritarian, the City is founded on democratic principles and is intended to serve the needs of its citizens.

As you can see, there are similarities between a business and the City. There are significant differences, also. I hope this explanation helps. If not, please call or write me at City Hall.
